Sept 20th "The Promises and Possibilities of Autumn" The Rev. Jacqueline Ziegler speaking. David Perry is the service's pianist. Autumn officially arrives on Wednesday, September 23. In the Laramie area I suspect that it is sweater time all day and night, though I could be wrong. I find that autumn lends to us the opportunity to ask, to reflect on the question "Who am I?" So in this reflection I'll lift up why this is so and offer some ways we can use this time of the year to answer that question and thus deepen our spirituality and/or help us commune with our souls.

Sept 27th "How do we know what we know?" The Rev. Jacqueline Ziegler speaking. David Perry is the pianist for this service. With this service I begin a six-part series called, "What Do You Believe?" It is a series that explores the most basic philosophical, spiritual and religious topics of all time.

Part III

In this section of my column I want to share some parts of the Letter of Agreement between the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Laramie (UUFL) and me. It notes that my position is a half-time settled ministry position and that I will provide ministerial services for 2 weeks a month for an average of 40 hours per week. At this point in time, I plan to work during the second and third weeks of the month. During those two weeks I'll have one day per week free of all Congregation responsibilities to devote to study and writing although I will be available for emergencies on that day. Just so you know, I chose the second week so that I would be in sync with the congregation when our children's religious education program is offered.

I am responsible for a minimum of twenty (20) worship services a year, including holidays and special services not offered on a Sunday, pulpit exchanges and for being the Service Leader with or without a guest speaker. I will have full liturgical responsibility, power and authority for designing and executing my worship services, ceremonies and rituals. When I am not preaching or being the Service Leader for a worship service, the Program Committee will be responsible for conducting the service with advice and counsel from me. Generally, I will be in the pulpit the second and third Sundays of the month, twice a month. However, so that you'll have a flavor or sense of my Sunday service style, sooner than later, I will offer four consecutive services beginning with September 13 and ending with October 4. After that I'll usually offer only two services a month with the exception of December when I'll provide two additional services: a contemplative and contemporary Winter Solstice service on Monday evening, December 21 and the Christmas Eve Candlelight service.

If you haven't done so already, I invite and encourage you to read the Letter of Agreement between UUFL and me. I believe you can find it on UUFL's website.

Part IV

Let me lift up that I do know people generally do NOT like to read long articles in the newsletter. Regarding the intent of my newsletter column, I have always used it as a way to communicate with members and friends important matters and information, and often I write from an educational perspective. So my columns might be considered by some to be on the lengthy side. As I am only working part-time, my column will be important to read, I believe. More often than not I won't be offering services about the topics that are in my columns. So, I do humbly encourage you to read the columns. Egads, this is already a very long column, but then how else are you going to know what is happening and/or what I am thinking about? By the way, I invite you to read the special insert with this month's newsletter, entitled "When You Should Call the Minister." May I suggest that you even put it on your refrigerator door!

Part V

I am really excited to be serving as the settled minister for UUFL-- it's both an honor and a privilege! I look forward to working with you on all kinds of activities and participating in congregational events as well as in the larger Laramie community. I'll plan to offer one or two adult religious education programs over the course of the year. I look forward to working with you to help UUFL become even better known in the larger Laramie community. I am raring to go!

When I am pensive about something or praying for insights, song lyrics or melodies often come to me as an answer. Sometimes it's easy to understand how the words and tunes playing through my mind are related to what I am pondering or praying about. At other times a connection is harder to discern. As I prepared to come to be your Minister, this snippet of lyrics kept going through my head: "traveling along, singing a song, side by side." It didn't take me long to realize that the lyrics reflect my hope that the adventure we're about to go on together will be one of "traveling along, singing a song, side by side." Call Me, I'll Be There



Experience tells me that members often do not know under what circumstances they should contact their minister. In the past I've frequently found when I casually ask someone how they're doing or what's happening with them, that's when I first find out that they are or had experienced some major problem or joy in their life. When I asked them why they didn't call me they say in all sincerity, "I didn't want to bother you; you're so busy." Now let me say that although that's a very considerate reason, it is not a criterion that should be used to guide a person in making a decision as to whether or not to get in touch with me. So, as we start out on this new adventure, I want you to know that what is happening to you is something that matters to me. When something major is or has happened in your life, please let me know regardless of it being happy, joyful, sad or depressing.

Below are some guidelines for you to use in deciding whether or not to call me. They are adapted from an article that my colleague, The Rev. Dr. Andrew Kennedy, wrote to help the members of his congregation decide when to

GUIDELINES FOR WHEN YOU SHOULD CALL THE MINISTER

When you don't know me but would like to.

When you have problems or concerns you'd like to discuss -- problems with your job, children, partner, or anything else where a sympathetic ear might be help. I do not do long term counseling or therapy, but many find it useful to sit and talk with me. I can usually provide referrals when it is necessary.

When someone close to you has died, is suicidal, or is critically ill.

When you'd like to make advance plans for your funeral or memorial service.

When you're planning to be married.

When you have given birth to a child.

When you wish to have a child dedication and naming service.

When you're pregnant, but wish you weren't.

When you have a friend or neighbor who would like more information about Unitarian Universalism.

When you're considering becoming a member of the Fellowship, but you still have some questions.

When you'd like to include the Fellowship in your will or make a special gift, but you're not sure how.

When you'd like to help in committee work or religious education teaching.

When, for some reason, you're angry with me.

When you'd like to talk about religion and spirituality.

When you need help, but you're not sure who to call.

When you've been arrested.

When you're chair of a committee and you don't know where to start or what to do next.

I hope these guidelines are helpful. However, since this list does NOT exhaust all possibilities, please feel free to contact me if you're in doubt!

Dear UUFL Congregation and Board,

Thank you for the honor of selecting me to become the new director and teacher of RE for the 2015-2016 church year. With the help and guidance of my wonderful predecessor Michelle Visser, the invaluable advice and wisdom of established congregation members, and of course, the input and feedback of the families I will be serving over the course of the year, I hope to provide the children of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Laramie with a spiritually nurturing and engaging experience during RE.

This year RE will take place on the second Sunday of each month, the first being September 13th. When I first started training to become the new RE director, I was told that RE stands for two things; Religious Education, and Religious Exploration. While I firmly believe in the importance of both, it is my desire to proceed with the intention of exploration in RE. Last year Michelle Visser mentioned the call for a “solid footing” for the RE program, and the desire for it to become a place of “consistent faith development for young UU members.” It is my hope to build off the solid footing she has provided, and nurture the growth of each individual’s personal morality and faith.

To foster this growth, the curriculum we will be exploring most frequently is called Moral Tales; A Tapestry of Faith Program for Children, by Alice Anachecka-Naseman and Elisa Pearmain. If you search the Unitarian Universalist Association’s website, UUA.org, for “Moral Tales,” you will be able to look through what lessons we will be investigating throughout the year. The program is designed for children in second and third grade, although I am confident that the messages of the curriculum will reach children of younger ages, and the activities provided (as well as other activities I will supplement from other curriculums and sources) will be engaging to kids of all ages. I encourage parents to come to me with any suggestions you may have for the direction of RE. I also wish to emphasize that the RE rooms are always open to any parent or congregation member who would like to take part in what we are doing.

Our first RE session this year will revolve around a story called “We Are All One,” from the Moral Tales session one. In order to ensure a safe and welcoming environment, a major part of our first session together will be spent investigating our notions of how best to treat other people. The children will be asked to come up with guidelines they are comfortable conducting themselves by, and at the end we will form a covenant; a promise from everyone to behave with respect towards one another.

While official RE will only take place once a month, children are incredibly welcome to join our child care provider, Leah Byrnes, and me every other Sunday for less formal fun activities. Among other activities, it is my plan to take the children to play music over at the park just across the street from the church occasionally when weather permits. I will make every effort to give advanced notice of those days. I have registration forms that I would ask each family that will be participating in RE to fill out sometime before our first session. These forms will be available from Aug. 23rd onward.

I look forward to exploring the principles of UU, and the mysteries and miracles of life with the youngest of the UU community!
